sonny's solvings

I read a book to the children this week called The Three Cups. It is a book about a boy, who when he turns 5,

receives a gift that he is told will give him lots of adventures. Expecting a ball glove or a cowboy hat, he opens the gift and sees three cups instead. "This is not a great gift!" he says. "How is this going to lead to adventure?" He finds out that he is going to start receiving a weekly allowance, and that money will be put in the three cups: some for spending, some for saving, and some for giving. Over time, he realizes that the cups were indeed a great gift, and that they did lead to great adventure: he buys a glove; and later on a car; and is able to give good things to people who are in need.

As we walk through Advent season, we are preparing for the great gift that God gave to the world in Jesus Christ. And like the gift before the boy opened it, as the prophets told about a great gift of God's action to bring forth a Savior, people were expecting a gift that they imagined would fit within their expectations. But when the Gift presented itself, both as a baby born to a marginal family, and placed into a feed

ing trough for animals, and then as an adult who regularly broke the Sabbath Laws and others, their reaction must have been like the 5-year-old boy's response when he saw the cups. "This is what you call God's gift? This is not what a Savior should look like!" Of course, over time, we have come to know that Jesus was indeed God's great gift to the world, like over time the boy came to know the value of those three cups. But it required a decision on the part of the early followers of Jesus to see his alternative approach to the Kingdom as a gift.

What are some of the things in your life that at the time were not understood as gifts, or might have even been painful, yet have become great gifts over time, when we choose to let it be? I think of the person who loses one job, to move into a place where they feel more loved and cared for than they were before. They eventually see the loss of the job as a gift. I think of a person who gets a diagnosis they did not want to get, but because of it, grows closer to family and friends. They might eventually see the diagnosis as a gift. I wonder if that might be the case when something changes in our church. Changes might make us uncomfortable or confused at first, but over time isn't there a good possibility that we might be able to see them as a gift?


As we approach this advent season, may this time of hope, peace, joy and love, be a time when we can be surprised by unexpected gifts in our lives, and may we always see God's hand and faithful presence in our lives.

But every year, advertisements beckon; the children plead, and it seems easier just to

indulge our wants and whims. Overspending, overeating, materialism and busyness rob us of our peace and joy and rob Jesus of his rightful role as the center of our celebration."

This year at Central, there will be opportunities to help us enjoy a gentler, more peaceful Christmas season. Free devotional guides, especially for the Advent season, are available in the sanctuary foyer. There will be meaningful worship each Sunday that includes special readings and prayers and candle-lighting. The Christmas Songfest on Dec. 13, will be a chance to relax and hear B.J. Myer play the organ, as well as participate in the singing of Christ


mas carols and other favorite hymns. Non-perishable food items for the H.U.M. collection bins can be brought to church to share our abundance with homeless or needy families in our community.

For example, our Angel Tree will be available on Nov. 29, to give us a chance to bless struggling families with Christmas gifts of toys or clothing for the children. Small groups are sharing meals with each other and with folks in need.

Stories That Move Me... Matt Nelson

My dad recounts fondly going to see Star Wars Episode Four "A New Hope" in 1977, and I remember seeing it when I was growing up some twenty years later. Nearly thirty years later, the sequel to one of the most beloved movie licenses is releasing this Holiday season! I can barely believe it! What is it about lightsabers, Jedi, Sith, and the Force that is so captivating to us? One possible answer is the battle between good and evil, the literal light and dark powers of the universe. We root for Luke Skywalker as he risks it all to destroy the Death Star. We laugh at Han Solo's quips and plays at Princess Leia. We tremble at the power of Emperor Palpatine. We cheer as Luke manages to somehow not be killed by Darth Vader. We celebrate at the triumph of the Rebel Forces.

I believe there is more to the story than the violence without. Throughout the Star Wars narrative (yes, even Episodes 1, 2, and 3), the characters struggle with the violence within themselves. While our heroes strive to do what is right by defeating evil, they run the dangerous risk of becoming that evil themselves. There is a light side and dark side to all of us, and we resonate with that reality. We follow Anakin from youth to Darth Vader, making choices that place him along the path to darkness. We witness Han flip-flop from bad to good, not caring for anyone but himself one minute and risking his life the next. The Jedi masters have a desire for peace but use violence to attain it. As Luke seemingly de-

feats Darth Vader, he has a choice to make: does he kill him and give into his rage and vengeful spirit, or does he not perpetuate the endless cycle of violence. There is something powerful and alluring to the dark side, but it is a trap. As Yoda says it best — "Fear leads to anger; anger leads to hate; hate leads to suffering."

So is Star Wars a story about good versus evil? Yes, but not only the "good guys" versus the "bad guys," but that war is waged within every character and within each of us. In Isaiah 45:7, God says "I form light and create darkness, I make well-being and create calamity, I am the Lord, who does all these things." Yet God calls us to the light through Jesus, the light of the world. John 16:33 reminds us that Christ has overcome the world, but not as a conqueror: as a living sacrifice. May we seek the light within this advent season, looking ahead to the light that is coming into the world.

Central's Servants: MARTY PETTY

Learning Trust

Marty Petty's roots at Central go back to 1970 when he and his parents moved to Daytona. An aunt and uncle, Priscilla and John Petty, invited them to Central Baptist Church where Marty heard a new kind of preaching, far different from the hellfire and brimstone sermons he heard back in Kentucky, sermons detailing God's punishment of sinners. Pastor Hal Marchman at Central spoke of God's love, His inclusive love for all of us. This positive emphasis on a loving God cemented Marty's ties with Central.

When elected deacon, Marty was proud to serve like the Christian men he looked up to, but when asked to serve as Chair, he declined several times. "I felt unworthy. I didn't think I had the tools to lead the deacons." When he finally accepted, he still felt he lacked vital leadership tools, "but God gave them to me and assured me He would always help me lead."

Always eager to learn, Marty capitalized on opportunities offered by Sunday School, Disciple, Emmaus, and now *The Story*. His four years as Deacon Chair, however, delivered major learning experiences. The best part has been the *unity* among the deacons, their desire to help improve Central and their willingness to do whatever was asked. On the flip side, things disrupting the church, such as the "music wars", have caused difficult times. As a leader, Marty's goal has always been for people to "get along, to come to church and worship God, showing love to God and each other."

Over and over during his years as Chair, Marty learned "to work hard for the church and then trust God to make it happen or show me how to make it happen" — major lessons in trust from the loving God Marty found at Central Baptist Church 45 years ago.

MARTY PETTY and his wife Darla recently celebrated their 45th anniversary. They have four daughters and seven grandchildren. Marty owns and operates the heavy equipment repair business started by his dad in Bunnell: Western Hills, Inc.
