One of my favorite hymns is not to be found in the Baptist Hymnal. We sang it on February 21<sup>st</sup>: "They'll

know we are Christians by our Love." The reason I love this hymn is that it makes some bold and important claims that we should be reminded of in our lives. The claims it makes are rather explicit, from the lyrics:

"We are one in the Spirit, we are one in the Lord. And we pray that all unity will one day be restored.

We will work with each other, we will work side by side. And we'll guard each man's dignity and save each man's pride.

We will walk with each other, we will walk hand in hand. And together we'll spread the news that God is in our Land."

And finally, the words of the chorus:

"They'll know we are Christians by our love, by our love, yes they'll know we are Christians by our Love."

The words by themselves are remarkable. To be reminded that with other Christians, even those I disagree with, I am "one in the Spirit," is important for me to remember. Equally important are the claims that when we work together to protect each other's dignity and pride, we are showing God's love, and that when we walk with each other and focus on fellowship and mutual care, we are spreading the news that God is in our land; that God is with us. Those are important claims to reflect on.

But what is really remarkable about the hymn, and made me appreciate it even more is the context in which the words were written. You can read more at hymnary.org, but the song's author was Peter Scholtes, who was from a wealthy northern suburb of Chicago. He was a parish priest on the Southside of Chicago in 1968 leading a youth choir in the church basement to get ready for an ecumenical, inter-cultural event. He could not find any music that was appropriate to the upcoming event, so he wrote the song himself.

It was Chicago, 1968, when protests and demonstrations were going on all around the city, and racial tensions were particularly high in the country. He could have avoided the provocative issues that surrounded that time, but instead he writes a bold song saying that we are one in the Spirit, that we will work with each other, and walk with each other, and that as we learn to love one another – black, white, Hispanic – and work together, and protect each one's dignity, we will show the world that we are Christians.

Makes me wonder what other kinds of bold songs that point others to God's love in our time, and in our context, we are missing, just waiting to be written.

### Linda's Log....

The Lenten season is a time for us to practice spiritual disciplines in an attempt to draw nearer to God. One of the spiritual disciplines that I find most helpful, and yet one that remains among the most difficult for me is SILENCE. Our culture is uncomfortable with silence. We are continually clamoring to fill the quiet spaces: talk, TV, video games, talk, telephones, conversations, talk, talk, talk, and more talk! If there is a pause in the conversation, we say something inane or simply walk away. I read somewhere that the length of time you can be in another's company without any talk, is the measure of the depth of the friendship. I want a deep friendship with God. So I'm trying to practice longer spaces of silence...where I might actually be able to hear the "still small voice" if it chose to speak to me... Yes, I still, at least at this moment, continue to have a "monkey mind" that freely swings, like monkeys in the treetops, from one topic to another when I try to be quiet...but I plan to

continue my efforts to settle my mind and spirit before God.

My typical start for the day during this season between Ash Wednesday and Lent opens with the online "Journey to the Cross," part of the year-round devotional site, d365.org (a ministry of Passport, Inc., and sponsored ecumenically by Passport, Inc, Cooperative Baptist Fellowship and other churches). It is a FREE devotional experience and can be delivered directly into your email or you can elect to receive a daily reminder with a link. Music by Ken



Medema accompanies each devotional. I highly recommend it. Regardless what techniques you may choose, I pray that your Lenten season will be filled with prayers that are silent as well as conversational. I pray that we all will be drawn closer to our Savior—that we will grow more comfortable with the silence and that we will be transformed and renewed.

I watch The Walking Dead. It is incredible, though getting slightly predictable. What I want to talk about, however, is the show after The Walking Dead - Talking Dead. Talking Dead is literally an hour of fans of The Walking Dead talking about what just happened on the last episode. There is a host and guests ranging from stars and writers from the show and other celebrity fans. They sit on a couch and discuss the new plotlines, new deaths, new loves, and whatever else might come up about The Walking Dead. It is a show about another show. And I watch it. And I am not alone. Thousands of people tune in to hear other people express their opinions on a fictional show.

I believe there is something there. One of the things that regularly breaks my heart about the current state of the church is how little people talk about their experience in worship. They might tell the pastor they enjoyed the sermon, or that the music touched them. But once they are through the doors of the sanctuary, it is not likely they will revisit the morning's activities. What if we gave

them an opportunity to share their thoughts together and to listen to people break down the moments of a worship service? Better yet, what if we streamed it online for those who could not attend to watch later? I feel for real transformation to exist, people must process their experience. Without processing what happened, it is too easy to simply move on to the next event (usually lunch). Not to say Central Baptist Church is the place to head up this idea, but it makes me excited to think about how the church can learn from the entertainment world and social media to enrich the lives of those seeking to follow Jesus to the fullest.

What do you think? Is this too far out to work? Would you benefit from an organized time to process like this? Let me know your thoughts and tell me of other ideas for the future church.
