This year, April is the month of Easter, the day of resurrection, of claiming the life that is



born from death through God. This year, April also contains all of Holy Week, and the rollercoaster of emotions and spiritual gymnastics that it encompasses, going from Palm Sunday high to Good Friday despair, and back to the Easter high. This year, April contains the final build up to Good Friday and Easter, called Lent, that time where we acknowledge our own incapacity to conquer sin, and confirm our need for the cross of

forgiveness and the empty tomb of the resurrection.


This year, April is a high and holy month...for the first half. But after April 16th, what will April have in store for us? For most of us, we think of Easter as a party. The church often treats it this way. At a party, we love the decorating and setting up, because as we prepare, we imagine those who will be present, who will compliment us on our decorations and planning, and we recognize the joy that comes in our preparation for the party. As we prepare for our church Easter party, we prepare to welcome long-lost family members, to put on our absolute Sunday best, to sing the loudest. We plan special choir numbers, and we prepare to bring our flowers forward to help decorate the church.

And then the party happens. It is awesome, and filled with bright and wonderful memories and smiles. But after the party, there is always a letdown. At a house party, the letdown comes when you have to clean up and put the house back together, often with the purpose of making it look like the party never happened. Not very exciting. In our churches, often the Sundays after Easter and Christmas are the least attended worship services in the church year. Why? The letdown. Because, consciously or unconsciously, we have treated these Holy Days like one time parties, and when the party is over, the excitement is over. Which brings us to the last half of April this year. It is post-Easter, after the Hallelujah Chorus, after the flowers.

But to think of Easter as just an annual event is to miss it altogether. Easter is not a singular event. Easter is the annual reminder that we live, every Sunday (really every day), as the day of Resurrection, because Christ is in us.

So this year, I invite you to think differently about Easter. Yes, there will be pageantry; there will be flowers; there will be special music; there will be renewed friendships; there will be people we have not seen in a long time. But let us not think of it as a one time event; let us instead think of it as the opening celebration of what God is doing in us as we live in and embrace the resurrection in our own lives.

ers will assist with improving temporary quarters for use by the church that is without a sanctuary due to a fire, while another team will clear brush and other bushes in order to construct a prayer garden. Still another team will visit and interact with residents of nursing homes.




Log-in...

Have you noticed that on the back of our Sunday bulletin before the church staff is listed, the first line notes: "Ministers---All Members"? This is because we have been given in Acts 6, the example of Stephen, who was chosen and trained by the Apostles to provide caring ministry to those in need. We are all ministers, whether formally ordained or not. Jesus calls us to provide compassionate care for others wherever we find ourselves. Our church has multiple structures in place already to do this: shepherds, Sunday morning small groups and other weekly bible study gatherings, various committees and teams, prayer teams. GriefShare, counseling sessions, etc. These caregivers and caregiver groups are to be commended for the work they are already doing...often merely by inspiration and genuine compassion. without any real training or guidance. Over the course of time, there have been a few good workshops and training opportunities to help us learn a bit of the "do's and don'ts" for effective pastoral care, but we are now looking toward becoming a Stephen Ministry congregation to equip and strengthen our skills in this area.

Stephen Ministries is an established not-for-profit Christian education organization, founded in 1975, for the purpose of helping congregations give and receive Christian care. There are more than 12,000 Stephen Ministry congregations, from more than 160 denominations in all 50 states, 10 Canadian provinces, and 24 other countries; and many of these have had Stephen

Ministry going strong for more than 30 years. Being affiliated with such an internationally recognized organization will give us the benefit of trust and confidence in the approaches and materials provided, but perhaps more importantly, being a Stephen Ministry church will give us opportunities to specifically and continually train laity to listen, encourage, and offer support when someone is in need.

Final Fantasy VII is my favorite videogame of all time. While it is not the first game I ever played, it was revolutionary for its time, with 3D models of characters you can control, visually stunning cut-scenes, and a fairly mature storyline dealing with environmental concerns, gender issues, and the search for one's true identity. I love the gameplay; I love the characters; I love the story. I've probably played all the way through this 60+ hour game five times. Nearly two years ago, the company that made Final Fantasy VII told the public it was working on a "remake" of the classic game. They had a trailer with updated graphics and everyone went crazy (in a good way). Then info started coming out regarding the "remake" factor of the game. The developers were telling journalists that they would not just be putting a shiny new coat of paint on the old game, but would be "remaking" it with modern styles and mechanics.

If you are still with me at this point, let's keep going. The original was a turn-based Role Playing Game (RPG), meaning that you would dictate the actions for each of your characters in turn, also allowing the enemy a chance to take their own turn. This made for very tactical-minded gameplay, making decisions for the whole party and watching those decisions unfold. The new remake would be an action-RPG. The player would control and make decisions for one character while the rest of the party was controlled by the AI or computer system. While there is nothing wrong with this style of gameplay, it is not what made FFVII great. They are making a completely different game using the same characters and storyline. Many people, especially newcomers to the franchise, are incredibly happy about the changes. Others, like me, are lamenting the loss of an era, begrudging a company who would alter a beloved franchise to cater to the desires of a new generation.

Do you see a parallel here? Is there a reason I am talking about a videogame and describing in such detail the manner in which it is being remade? Of course – it has to do with the church! The church is being "remade." It is not getting a new coat of paint – it is becoming an entirely new thing. It is using the same characters and story while taking on trends from the world that appeal to a new generation of believers and making something different. There are people who are ecstatic about this change, hailing the past ways as arcane and boring. Many others are lamenting the loss of an era.

This new game has the potential to be great. Or it may go the way of several "remade" Hollywood movies that can't hope to stand against the original. But have you ever heard a young person talk about the new version of a movie you once loved? They will al-



most guaranteed *love* the new movie and find the old version droll and dumb. Developers still make turn-based RPGs, but the market for them has apparently dwindled enough to convince major developers to change direction to fit with the times. Churches that stick to older models still exist, but times truly have changed.

What do you think? Are these "remakes" of church just a fad, following the money and the fame and the young fan base? Or are they necessary evolutions to an ever-changing institution to meet the needs of a new generation? Come find me and tell me what you think.

Central's Servants: MIKE O'SULLIVAN

Golf Pro and Deacon by Joan Singley Schrysen

 Professional Golfer's Assocaition (PGA) member for 54 years, 24 as an officer

- Played 36 tournaments in one year, Oceanside Country Club's record-holder with a score of 58
- Mike O'Sullivan Trophy named for him

Mike O'Sullivan is a true golf pro, even though he didn't start playing until he was fifteen and never had a lesson in his life. His first clubs were old and beat up, but he watched good players and played with a lot of them, getting better and better.

In the Air Force after high school, Mike won the 8th Area Championship and qualified for the McDill Air Base team. After his discharge he turned pro, serving as Club Pro, playing a lot of tournaments and teaching.

Raised a Catholic, Mike, like so many, left the church of his childhood and remained unchurched throughout most of his adult life. He married and raised a family before his first wife died of lung cancer. About 14 years ago he renewed his friendship with a fellow Mainland High School graduate. Patty also a widow, was a lifelong, active Baptist. After their marriage, twelve years ago, Mike continued unchurched for a while, watching television while Patty went to church on Sunday mornings. One day he announced, "If you're going to church, maybe I'll go with you." Eventually he was rebaptiszed - on the same day as Patty's grand-daughter.

Mike first came to Central about the same time as Sonny and joined in 2009. Over the years, he developed az great regard for Sonny's Bible studies. Patty reports "Mike is like a sponge. Wednesday nights, Mike absorbs all of that."

Mike has served Central many ways, sometimes drawing on his golf background. Reporting on several Homestead mission trips: "I used to take 2000 balls and some old clubs down there, and the kids could beat the balls out in the field. They had more fun than you can imagine." He also taught golf at Central's camp.

For several years people asked Mike to serve as deacon, and he always declined. Despite years of service on the Building and Grounds Committee and various mission trips, he felt unqualified. This year, in prayer, Mike was assured that his time had come to serve as deacon.

Mike O'Sullivan's practicality, humility and realism gleaned from a lifetime in the world of golf are unique blessings for Central and her deacons.

MIKE AND PATTY O'SULLIVAN have a truly blended family, proudly declaring it one family: two sons, four daughters, ten grandchildren and one great grand child.
