Sonny's Sayings...

So by now, you probably know that the family and I went to South Carolina on August 21 to see the solar eclipse. When I realized the week before that we could get there within a day's drive, I knew that I was going to take

the kids, and we were going to drive to the area of totality, which ended up being in Orangeburg, South Carolina. It was certainly worth it.

As the day approached, I kept reading articles from people, both scientists and amateurs, who described seeing a solar eclipse as a "spiritual experience." So as I approached the day, I prepared myself to have a spiritual moment. After all, this is God's Creation, and seeing something like this was truly unique, but I kept wondering how would it be spiritual. Then on the morning of the 21st, a quote from TED.com popped up: "True awe, a sense of wonder and insignificance in the face of something enormous and grand, is rare in our lives." I thought to myself that events like parting the Reed Sea, the Resurrection, the multitude of angels appearing to the shepherds, would fit that description. That gave me direction in how to open my spirit. I was going to reflect on my insignificance in the face of God's magnificence.

But something entirely different took place. As the moon finally filled the entirety of the sun's face, and darkness fell on Orangeburg, I looked up at the eclipse with my naked eye, and it was like everything and everyone faded away. I was at a park with complete strangers, a lot of Floridians who had traveled like us, and all of my family. But it was as if I were all alone. I felt as if I could almost hear God actually speaking the words, "Look

at this. This is what I can do. And this is for you." After being mesmerized, I felt a tug on my arm (Carson), and a kiss on my neck (Melissa), both trying to get my attention, so I could be present with them in that moment. But the lure of the eclipse will stay with me for a while.



Reflecting on that moment, I thought of Jim Smith's words

that I often steal: "God loves you as if there was no one else in all of Creation for Him to love." I could imagine God saying, "I want you to experience this moment as if there was no one else I did it for. "And so, instead of feeling insignificant, I felt the opposite. I felt incredibly significant and important. I felt, for a fleeting moment, that sense of God's immense love, and that it was for me. God's love being for us is not always a lesson we need the eclipse for, but it does require that we open our eyes to see it.

I hope that the rest of the month is meaningful for you. Blessings, Sonny

Admittedly this may be the case for a few, and some may have found a better fit in a different faith community. However, I know from previous personal experience how difficult it can be to return to church after an extended absence. Sometimes it's simply that we've gotten out of the habit of worship and have allowed leisure activities or general busyness to consume us. Sometimes we fear being singled out as a returning prodigal if we come back or possibly we aren't certain we have been missed or that we would indeed be welcomed back.

Since we are all ministers with the responsibility to reach out, I'd like to challenge you to seek out an old friend that you haven't talked to in awhile. Although it's never a good time for a contrived set-up like the hilarious Capital One credit card ad where Jennifer Garner meets her old friend ostensibly to "catch up" but really only wants to sell her on a new credit card

Compassion with Gratitude

by Joan Singley Schrysen "A God thing!" That's what Joan Rademacher, Central's Counselor, calls her chance encounter with Jim Scott soon after

retiring from Daytona State College. He requested her resume leading to an interview with the Central's Counseling Team Leaders.

But her compassion almost sabotaged this meeting. Concerned about the inability of clients to pay the going rate of \$120, Joan really wanted to do *pro bono* counseling. The Counseling Ministry Team felt that paying clients get more out of counseling. Joan proposed a compromise: a sliding scale — of just \$10 to \$30. She quickly added, "I won't keep the money — I will turn it all over to the church." For six years now, she has worked under this arrangement. "It's win-win, a deal made in Heaven," she says happily.

Asked about the best part of counseling: "Watching people grow. When something has been monumental and they finally make it over, and I had a part in it — Ohhh..., that is so rewarding!"

The most difficult? "A resistant client. They know they have to do something, but they're unwilling to do it. You can't push them. They have to do it themselves."

Growing up south of Chicago, Joan attended Southern Illinois University to become an English teacher. During her senior year, her English professor told her, "You're going to be a wonderful English teacher, but you have a very compassionate side. You should consider going on for a masters degree in counseling. Your personality is just made for it." Joan finishes the story: "So I thought about it and applied to grad school. Long story short: she was correct. I love English, but I love the counseling more."

Joan's compassion is matched by her gratitude. Each night she falls asleep thanking God for the blessings of the day. "I realize I wouldn't be where I am today without the love of God." She is especially grateful to be at Central. "From the time I first walked in the door, everyone has been so loving here. You get hugs and so much appreciation. It's a wonderful place to be. I thank everyone for treating me as one of the Central family, for trusting me with what goes on in their lives and giving me the opportunity to help."
