I grew up a Chicago Cubs fan. Therefore, love of baseball is at my core, but winning is not. We Cub fans, like the Red Sox and Indians for many years, were accustomed to uttering an often-repeated phrase: "Just wait 'till next year." The implication being, of course, that next year, things would start over, and the Cubs might have a chance.

Most often those words were spoken with a bit of fatalism. We knew the Cubs didn't have any really good players, and had no plans for good players in the next year. So saying "just wait 'til next year" was just an attempt to get Cardinals fans (every Cub fan's nemesis) off our backs and change the subject. But sometimes there was real hope. Maybe the second half of the year they had done well, or maybe they had a rookie or two that had shown some promise, and the team could build around them.

We often do the same thing with our lives. Families that I know have had a difficult year, will often say to me, "I can't wait for the calendar to change," or "I can't wait for this year to be over with," or even, "2018 is going to be a better year. It has to be."

But in real life, you do not get a "next year," preceded by months of down time (the offseason) in which you can trade for new players, or instill new practices with the ones that you already have. In real life, you don't get much of a spring training. Every day is a new day, but it still carries with it the concerns, the struggles, and the challenges of the previous day, along with its hopes and successes.

So when we turn over the calendar, and say "Happy New Year" to those around us, the slate is not wiped clean, no matter how much we would prefer for that to be the case. To quote a popular phrase these days, "the struggle is real." But that is not to say that saying "Happy New Year" is a futile exercise. Far from it. While our reality might not change, the way we view that reality can definitely change. Instead of seeing the drudgery of our lives – from the aches and pains to the difficult circumstances – we instead might be able to see an opportunity to sense and recognize God's presence, giving us the strength to face that drudgery. Instead of seeing the broken relationships or broken dreams of our lives, we might see that God can heal those relationships, and God can give us new dreams.

So this New Year, may you see God's love and grace more evident in the challenges that you face. May you not be determined by things in your past, or things that have been done to you. Instead, may you be determined by the God who created you, who loves you, and who will always be present with you. Happy New Year!

**Halifax Urban Ministries to Hold
10th Annual Empty Bowls Event
Jan. 20, 11 a.m.-2 p.m.**

One of our ministry partners, H.U.M., whose primary goal is urban prevention and intervention of homelessness will hold their annual fund-raiser this month at the BCU Center for Civic Engagement, with silent auction beginning at 10:30 a.m. Keepsake bowls created at ten Volusia County schools will be featured, along with soup, salad and baked goods donated by area restaurants and various art and gift items. Passport Kids Camp for kids grade 3-5 (completed) is being held at Stetson, June 10-13, 2018. The total cost is \$308 per person. Jason started dating a young woman named Isabella and she was brave enough to tag along with the boys and soon she was a regular as well. Then their neighborhood friends, Emily and Ian, became curious and decided to give us a try. This led to an

interesting dynamic because the group all attended another local church closer to their homes. A new era began where it was not a guarantee the kids would show up Sunday or Wednesday because they might just be at the other church. During this time, Isabella’s brothers, Dylan and Niko, started to ask their sister if they could come with her to church. Hi-



lariouly, she did not want them to come because she wanted the group to remain small and she thought they would be too immature. An agreement was reached for them to come every other week, which before long became basically every week.

With the new blood bringing new energy into the youth department, some on-the-fringe kids (Alyssa, Camyrn, Jake, Jamani, Josh, Jovan, Hailee) from before I started began to renew their interest in attending. Soon we had regular numbers hovering around 10-15, way more than the 2-3 at the beginning. It was a fun learning curve to navigate the growing numbers, arranging rides, and figuring out who would be there and who not.

Jump forward a bit and we have lost several students to other extracurricular activities, some to relocation, and one or two for seemingly no reason. Such is life among teenagers! But we’ve also added a few more friends in Daniel, Jumari, Nick, Noah and Wain. Melissa and I have more help with Alice, Laura, Lisa, Kirk and Kristin adding to the mix.

All this review to say two things: change begins with one person stepping out in faith. Without Nancy our group would look totally different. Will the next phase be caused by your faithfulness? Who in your world might need a group of young disciples learning and growing together? Who might you know who may be called to serve alongside our volunteers to lift up and inspire our youth?

The other is that the time we have with these kids may be short, but I believe the impact can last a lifetime. As we show them there are people who love them and want them to succeed, they are building confidence to be the children of God they were created to be. As they are loved, they learn to love others. Central's Servants: **JIM PAGE**
Minister to the Marginalized

Few know that during the Cold War Jim Page flew missions over the North Pole as an Air Force navigator with the Strategic Air Command. Fresh out of the University of Florida, Jim served three years on active duty before returning to GE in Syracuse, New York to resume his career as an electrical engineer.

As a project manager, Jim led a team charged with developing computer-generated display systems – visual simulations using early digital technology – to train pilots. As satisfying as this was, Jim’s true calling lay in a different direction.

“I’ve always felt I needed to be out giving aid and comfort to people on the margin,” Jim said. Over the years, Jim served four groups of the disenfranchised.

He and his wife Joyce started teaching and leading youth groups while Jim was in the Air Force, stationed in Tampa. Their team teaching continued through the years, in a succession of churches, until they landed at Central. Here they started a much-needed class for young adults that continues to this day, although the young adults are no longer so young.

Even before the Pages joined Central, Hal Marchman asked them to lead a discussion group for alcoholics at the Stewart Marchman Center. Fearing they could not relate since they were not alcoholics themselves, they were reluctant to accept. In true Marchman fashion, Hal reassured them, “Of course you can do it.” Thus began a long ministry to addicts and alcoholics spanning 24 years.

In the early 90’s HIV and AIDs were little understood and greatly feared. Any victim was avoided and stigmatized. Jim began to minister to these patients with loving care and concern. He led a seminar on HIV/AIDS at Central and recruited others to share in this ministry. His work with AIDS/HIV patients continued long after Jim disconnected from it.

Finally, Jim has always felt that each child should have the opportunity to develop into the best person he could be. For 15 years as a Guardian Ad Litem Jim served as an advocate for children who were afflicted and abused.

Youths, the addicted, HIV/AIDS patients, children – each are on the margin in one way or another – yet over the years countless individuals have had a better life because of Jim’s commitment to minister to the marginalized.

JIM PAGE and his wife Joyce have three children and four grandchildren (three living).
