

Sonny's Sayings...

One of the unlikely marriages of dates this year is that Ash Wednesday falls on February 14th, which also happens to be Valentine's day. What a strange coincidence. The origin of Ash Wednesday goes all the way back to the ancient church, as the beginning of the season of Lent, and it reminds us of two important things. First, it reminds us of our mortality, and

therefore our need for repentance (turning away from sin, and turning toward Jesus) in order to share in the eternal life God promises. And second, it marks the beginning of Jesus' journey toward the cross and Jerusalem, described in Luke 9:51 and following, the purpose of which was to forgive us for the sins that keep us separated from God.

Valentine's day has a lengthy tradition as well, possibly going back to the martyrdom (killing) of St. Valentine of Rome on a February 14 in the 3rd century. He was purportedly martyred, according to Wikipedia, for performing weddings for Roman soldiers forbidden to marry while in the army, and for ministering to Christians who were being persecuted. But it wasn't until the 18^h century, in England, that lovers began to associate February 14 as a day for expressing their love for each other. It might seem, at first glance, like these two traditions should be completely separate: one is about repentance, the other is about lovers. It might seem unrelated, until you read the Song of Solomon, one of the least read books of the Bible. While at times it can make you blush, the Song of Solomon describes the passionate pursuit of two lovers, one for another (Valentine's day). It is read annually as a part of the Passover feast in Jewish homes, because they have taken the Song of Solomon story as an allegory of God's passionate pursuit of us, which finds its climax in the Passover Lamb, the final plague, which gave the Israelites their freedom. In Christian tradition, we find that the story of God's passionate and relentless love for us has its climax on the cross, where Jesus unabashedly displays his Love for all to see, and opens the door for our repentance (Ash Wednesday) and forgiveness.

So this February 14th, I invite you to reflect on this year's unique intersection of traditions, and consider your own journey to the cross, your own sense of repentance. Is it full of the same kind of passion that God has for us, or is it dormant and dull? Either way, I invite you to rekindle your passion for God, by pondering God's passion for us.

LINDA'S LOG...

This new year is bringing wonderful, exciting opportunities to serve and to grow. Everywhere I look I see folks who are stepping up to HELP! Just to mention a few service opportunities, the mission kits (available from a tub near the sanctuary altar) have given us all a concrete way to serve every week if we like. Serving a meal at H.U.M.'s North St Bridge of Hope happened in December and lots of our folks attended Halifax Urban Ministry's "Empty Bowl" fund-raiser a few weekends ago. Many of our folks also regularly contribute food to the collection tubs around campus for local hungry families. After our "first Sunday" worship service, ushers are available to re-



ceive a monthly offering for local mission needs such as money for an over-due energy bill or a bus pass to get to work or one night's shelter at the Salvation Army.

THIS weekend is another chance to reach out as our Mission Team sponsors the annual Soup 'R Chili Cook-off after church in Adams Hall. The soup and chili, and other trimmings are all donated! The auction items are also donated! ALL money raised will go toward the life-changing summer mission opportunity. Like last summer, the plan is inter-generational (all ages can participate). Central's volunteer missionaries will journey to the Atlanta area to perform mission tasks in late June. Many who participated last year would have been unable to go without the generosity of our congregation. I think the approximate cost last year was about \$350/person, but the value is deeper and more important than the fiscal expenditure. Team building and serving those in need alongside other Christian friends, teaches life-skills (especially for our youth) and reinforces Jesus' teachings about respect, unity and love for Each Other as well as for The Other! Serving away from home, out of one's comfort zone, is an incomparable growth opportunity. And the skills carry-over into our local community. Serving together keeps us together; a number who went last year have helped with at least two projects here since their return, in addition to helping with hurricane clean-up after Irma.

Each year, new lessons are learned and in response to one of last year's lessons, this year there will be fewer fund-raising events. This Sunday's cook-off and auction will be one of two main events held this spring to cover the mission trip cost. So, it's important to invite folks from outside our congregation to join in the fun! The "at-the-door" price (\$6) is still VERY low. The auction items are desirable and well worth the bids. Each person can have a part in making this happen by attending and bringing guests, by entering the soup and chili competitions and by fervent prayer that God will use our efforts for the good of His kingdom. I'm hoping to see you there after worship!!

This past month the youth of Central went to Jacksonville to see a Christian entertainment

concert called Winter Jam. Sixteen of us piled into the church bus after school Friday evening and went in hopes of having a decent time. It truly was a blast! The artists and speakers were fun and motivating, inviting the attendees to step out and live their faith, take on real issues of the day, stand up for Jesus, and know they are not alone. There were a few performers we missed at the very beginning of the show, but the first major artist, KB, blew us away and really set the tone for the evening. He is a local Christian hip hop artist that geniusly combined rapping with other contemporary music such as Hillsong's Oceans to bring the unfamiliar and skeptical audience into full support, singing and praising along with him. The lights and sound were thrilling, and the kids immediately got into the whole thing. Kari Jobe came shortly after and brought us to a different place of

worship with her husband Cody Carnes. I knew this would be the adults' wheelhouse, and we were not disappointed as Kari awakened the arena to the presence of God's Spirit in that place. Next was an unexpected favorite, comedian John Crist. If you've never seen his videos on social media, they are hilarious and sometimes probing incites into popular Christian culture. His 10-15 minute set had us laughing non-stop, giving the

youth plenty to joke about on the trip home.

Now, no large gathering of Christians would be complete without some sort of offering, and both the opportunity to sponsor a child through Compassion International and to support Winter Jam were given. Building 429 gave a lively show, but at this point we were mostly hyped up for the headliner Skillet to light it up. These Christian rockers have toured with secular artists Papa Roach, Breaking Benjamin, and Shinedown, but their passion for Christ was made evident not only



in their powerful lyrics but the lead singer John Cooper's multiple spoken word moments. John used the platform of exciting rock musician to inspire the arena full of kids that their life means something and that God loves them. Combine that with pyrotechnics and thundering rock music, the youth all said Skillet was the highlight of the night.

An enormous thank you to anyone who gives to the youth program at Central because it is through you we are able to bring kids that otherwise wouldn't be able to come to events like these, even at the incredible rate of \$15. The same is true for our summer mission trips and other gatherings that expose our youth to the greater Christian community. All praise be to God for sanctioning Central as a safe place for youth to come together and experience God's love. Peggy Lynn Gibson LONG-TIME PRAYER WARRIOR

"I can always pray." Peggy Lynn Gibson is poised to pray whenever a need arises. During the many years she worked, her daily commute was dedicated to prayer. Today she prays while washing dishes. "It's important that people know you are praying for them," she says, so she also sends cards and calls folks.



Born and raised in a coal mining town, Peggy Lynn fell in love and married her high school sweetheart while still in high school. Her husband Bo became a miner, but in 1959 he was injured. He and Peggy Lynn relocated to Daytona Beach.

Always a people person, Peggy Lynn soon met many folks who influenced her life in Florida. At the yellow stamp store, her first job here, she met Hazelle Fenty who invited her to Central. At church she met Light'nin' Epton and Mary Moyer who needed part-time help at the new Speedway. First hired as a file clerk, Peggy Lynn progressed to typist. Eventually Mrs. Annie B. France hired her fulltime. She wanted Peggy Lynn to assume the responsibility for balancing out all the credit card machines, but she refused.

"Try it for a month or so. If you don't like it you can go back to your old job."

"Well, of course, I loved it." Eventually Peggy Lynn became Ticket Office Manager, a position she held until her retirement.

Asked her thoughts on Jesus, Peggy pondered her reply. "He's my savior, but also my friend. When I think of what he had to work through living in those days, dealing with the disciples and trying to make them understand – sometimes my heart aches for him. He's an awesome savior!"

Since joining Central in 1960 Peggy Lynn has served in many capacities – helping with Wednesday night dinners and Joy Class projects, as a member of the Personnel and Nominating Committees, as deacon and choir member. But her most rewarding work was as cook at camp for 14 years, "because of the children and the opportunity we had to make a difference in their lives."

Today Peggy Lynn is a faithful member of the Prayer and Care Team. Once a prayer request is posted, it's not long before her praying hands icon appears, a sign that Prayer Warrior Peggy Lynn is at work.

Peggy Lynn and Bo Gibson have been married 62 years. They specialize in trios – three sons, three grandchildren, and three great grandchildren.
