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Sonny's Sayings...

In the scriptures we read that many who were able traveled to the Temple in Jerusalem for the annual festival of the Passover. The understood purpose of the journey was multi-fold. First, it was for people to be able to draw physically closer to God. While the actual first Passover took place, according to scripture, in Egypt, not Jerusalem, the pres-



ence of God (who had orchestrated the escape from Egypt) was understood to reside in the Holy of Holies, a chamber at the heart of the Temple. So to be close to God, to offer up thanksgiving to God, and to worship God, you would go to the Temple if you were able.

Second, the pilgrimage was for people to remember. Each Passover meal, the story of the first Passover was recited at Jewish tables as they ate a meal together. Each element stood for a different part of the story, and what they experienced in slavery and liberation. This telling was not a few verses, or a short summary. It was long, and took up to 3-4 hours. The words to the story were followed by affirmations of God's provision, power, justice and grace.

Third, the pilgrimage was for people to be together. The Passover was not understood as an individual release from captivity. It was something that they experienced together, and so drawing together, as closely as possible, to share in the story, and in drawing closer to the presence of God became a communal event. Sure, people had personal reflections on what the Passover meant to them (Jesus' re-imagining of the symbolic meaning of the food is a good example of this), but those personal experiences were brought out of a communal experience and re-living of the first Passover.

Speaking of journeys, we talk about the Lenten season, which we are in the middle of right now, as a journey to the cross of Jesus. And I encourage you, to keep the same purposes for our journey as the Jews kept for theirs. Our purpose in journeying to the cross should be to draw closer to God. Even though the church building has flaws, its purpose is to provide a real space where the main thing is God. Draw close to God. Another purpose in our journey to the cross should be to remember. We may have heard the story of the crucifixion and the events leading up to it, countless times, but each time we hear it and read it, we affirm that it is, sometimes mysteriously, the centerpiece of our faith and our restoration. And finally, the third purpose in our journey to the cross should be to be together. We might not agree on all things, but by drawing near together, and by remembering the story together, we are reminded that we are a part of community. And when we recognize together that the cross of Christ was for all of us, we realize our need for each other.

I hope that this season of Lent is one that is special for you. I look forward to seeing you on Sundays!

LINDA'S LOG...

There's a Robert Fulghum book titled, What On Earth Have I Done?...remember, he's the one who wrote All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten. If you're not familiar with him, this second title may give a clue what a satirical philosopher he is. He makes me chuckle because his comments about life remind me that most of us take ourselves entirely too seriously and yet there's truth to be discovered in the midst of humor. He suggests in What on Earth Have I Done? that there are several "Mom" questions that spontaneously spill out of the mouths of moms (and dads, too!): "What on earth have you done?", "What in the name of God are you doing?", "What will you do next?".... Fulghum says if we can look ourselves in the mirror NOW and answer these, then perhaps we can also eventually answer the one REALLY GREAT "Mom" question, "Who do you think you are?"

I've been thinking a lot about his second question, but I'd rearrange the words to "What are you doing in God's name?" It occurs to me that if we are truly trying to live as Christians, then everything we do should be "in God's name." Of course, it's easier to stand back and let others carry the main responsibility, especially in the golden years that have previously been filled with MUCH work and busyness, and particularly when we feel that we've earned some time off. I've even heard a few folks say that church can be a good place to hide out, pretending to ourselves that because the church has accomplished something

that somehow we own it, too, regardless of the fact that our only contribution was a small offering and sitting in the pew a few times a month. However, I'd like to suggest that God still has much for each of us to do, much that he "expects" from us, regardless of our age or stage in life. We continue to bask in His unconditional love, but in order to become and re-



main the person He designed us to be, I believe He expects us to forever and always use our gifts and talents "in His name."

I feel blessed to serve a congregation that affirms the growth and service of all, regardless of age, gender, orientation or national origin. There's a wealth of wisdom and experience here at Central and tasks aplenty for each one to contribute. Our church needs you and if you're not serving, I hope you'll let me know what gifts you have that you'd like to use in God's name. It is a pleasure to help connect folks in God's service.

Many are already serving at maximum level, but we want to be clear that there is always room for and need of everyone's contribution. I'm continually re-discovering and trying to find ways to deepen my life in Christ. I appreciate the Lenten season because it reminds me that I haven't arrived and in fact, I have a painfully long way to go. I'm hoping that you'll join me in this Lenten season of self-examination to more fully affirm and rediscover who we are in Christ. Then maybe we can all more honestly answer that really great "Mom" question: "Who do you think you are?"

"NEW" Mothers Day Activity—Messages About Mom!




