Sonny's Sayings

November is an interesting month for Christian in America. This is a month for gratitude. Thanksgiving Day in the United States happens at the end of November, and is intended for us to give thanks to God for all of our provisions. It is traditionally a month of harvest, and a celebration that God has given the sun, the rain, and the labor to harvest good crops. In our time, it is an opportunity to give thanks for food, but also for family, for faith, for community, and for friends. And so, many churches will have at least one Sunday per year where they celebrate Thanksgiving, but others extend the entire month of November for giving thanks.

But in November, the church also celebrates the last Sunday of the Christian year before we start all over again with Advent. This last Sunday is traditionally called Christ the King Sunday, or in more modern terms, Reign of Christ Sunday. It is a day for us to remember all of the stories that we have heard about Jesus over the course of the year. We remember the healing stories of Jesus, the teaching stories of Jesus, the signs that Jesus performed, and the personal encounters that the disciples had with Jesus. And then we take all of those memories, and gather them together, and we ask, "What do these stories tell us about Jesus?" Each of those memories are intended to draw us to the conclusion, like the Roman Centurion and others who witnessed the crucifixion and resurrection concluded, that Jesus is surely the Son of God. On Christ the King Sunday, we confess together (even with all of our doubts and questions) that Jesus is King, and that he reigns over all creation, now and forever.

What makes it even more interesting, is that often Thanksgiving Sunday (before Thanksgiving) and Reign of Christ Sunday are the same day on the calendar. That is not the case this year, but often it is. So which do we celebrate? Thanksgiving has great hymns, like "Come Ye Thankful People Come" and "Count Your Blessings." But Reign of Christ Sunday has great hymns too, like "O Worship The King" and "Crown Him with Many Crowns." And the message that each Sunday contains is powerful and needed.

Perhaps the best thing for us, is to recognize that we can be grateful because Jesus Reigns. Because Jesus is at the right hand of God, and also present with us, we can be grateful for all of our blessings, and that when life is not so much of a blessing, God is still with us. And likewise, we become more grateful when Jesus' reign takes center stage in our lives, and life becomes less about whether there is rain or sunshine, and more about God's presence in the midst of it all.

I hope that your November is full of gratitude for what God is doing in your life, and full of humility in light of God's reign.

FILLED WITH JOY, LED BY THE HOLY SPIRIT

Laurie Moran radiates joy when she speaks of leading music at Central -- joy of working with talented and dedicated people and the challenge of preparing both contemporary and traditional music for our blended service while trying to reinforce Sonny's message for the day.

Several God-moments directed Laurie's path to Central. In her twenties, for many years, she had a rock and roll band, Lady Fire that toured the country, even appearing in a Mel Brooks movie. The theft of all her equipment forced Laurie to return home to rural New York. Unable to perform, she was free to attend an eight-day contemplative retreat called Mission sponsored by the Catholic church where her uncle/godfather was priest. It was a powerful experience that changed her life.

Eventually Laurie moved to Daytona. A chance encounter while she was performing at Barnes and Noble (truly a God moment) led her to develop "Heal the Child" a program designed to raise awareness of child abuse prevention. Laurie presented it in many venues and had been doing workshops at a facility in DeLand for a year. Suddenly they announced their closing the following week. That very afternoon (surely another God-moment) Gary Broughman, an acquaintance from years earlier, sent her an email about the vacancy at Central. Laurie had reservations about working with Baptists, but "This little God-voice kept telling me, 'You need to check this out,'" she says.

The interview was an eye-opener. "Everyone was so pleasant and treated me so nice. I said I'd do it for four months and see if it would work for me." There were interesting instructions for the music: make the traditional a bit more contemporary sounding, and the contemporary not so loud. "Finding that middle ground for me has been fun, a joyful challenge."

Christmas brings unique opportunities for joy... In New York Laurie formed Simon's Angels, a group of Christmas carolers from ten churches. They sang for hospitals, nursing homes, and retired nuns. In Daytona she started a similar group, Simon's Angels South. Twice the White House invited the two groups to perform for their mobility challenged tours.

Last Christmas Laurie recruited singers from many churches to augment Central's choir for their Community Christmas Celebration. This year she plans to perform the cantata at several nursing homes as well.

Laurie, our joyful, God-led Music Leader, sends an important message to our readers: our intentionally blended service is a *treasure*. We need to appreciate and publicize our intergenerational worship with both traditional and contemporary elements."

LAURIE MORAN is one of eight children. She currently is caring for her 93-year-old mother as well as teaching piano, guitar and voice. She also teaches at a Montessori school.
