Sonny's Sayings

I'm writing this from the auto-care waiting room in Walmart on the Tuesday morning before Thanksgiving, and I have to tell you it's eerie in here. I arrived at about 7:15 this morning, checked in, and then as I was walking around the store looking for the restroom, it felt eerily empty. I could hear an employee 4 or 5 aisles over whistling. Somewhere on the other side of the store, you could hear a machine cleaning the floors. Both of those noises are almost never audible, at least from the distance where I was hearing them, on account of the busyness of a Walmart.

As I was thinking about how empty this store was, I remembered visiting a Walmart late on Christmas Eve, probably 12 or 13 years ago, looking for stocking stuffers for the kids. It was so busy, you could barely maneuver your cart around the aisles, and I remember waiting 30 minutes in line to check out, well after midnight.

No doubt my Walmart store will gradually ramp up in busyness as Christmas approaches. And as Walmart gets busier and busier, our Christmas experience will get busier as well. We'll see more houses with their Christmas decorations up; we'll empty our pockets on Christmas gifts; we'll attend Christmas parties.

I can't help but wonder, however, if our faith will increase along with our busyness. In Luke 18:8, after telling the

Parable of the Wicked Judge, where Jesus was encouraging the disciples to pray and not lose heart, he asks this question: "When the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?"

I thought about ways that we can increase, not the busyness of our faith, but the authenticity, the urgency, and the intensity of our faith, in ways that stand in stark contrast to how our culture treats Christmas. And so I made a list that I intend to rotate through as the days move toward December 25:

- 1. Reflect on the wonder of a God who becomes flesh and dwells among us. (John 1: 14).
- 2. Think about what you can give to those who might be overlooked at this time of year (Isaiah 1:17).
- 3. Celebrate and express your gratitude for the relationships that God has given to you (John 13:1).
- 4. Find ways to shine the "Christmas lights" of your faith (Matthew 5:16).

I'm sure you can find other items to add to your list, but this is my list for this year. I hope your Christmas season is filled with holiday cheer.

A Christmas Hymn Story



One of my favorite Christmas hymns is "It Came Upon the Midnight Clear" by Edmund Sears, who was the pastor of the Unitarian Church in Wayland, Massachusetts. This poem-turned-carol was written in 1849. It is said that a pastor friend of Sears, William Parsons Lunt, requested that the hymn be written for his Sunday School class. The famous melody tune "Carol," that most often accompanies this hymn, was not written until 1850. The melody "Carol" was specifically written for Edmund Sears' text. The poem was written during a difficult period of Sears' personal life. The US-Mexican War was taking place at the same time, bother of which no doubt go a long way toward explaining the song's numerous references to darkness, sin and strife. This hymn also breaks with many traditional Christmas carols as it does not focus on Bethlehem but rather the world of Sears' day, filled with war and a longing for peace. Something that we long for still today. This beautiful hymn can be found in our hymnals on page 93.

"It came upon the midnight clear,
That glorious song of old,
From angels bending near the earth
To touch their harps of gold;
"Peace on the earth, good will to men
from heaven's all-gracious King."
The world in solemn stillness lay
To hear the angels sing."

Happy New Year!

Wait, what? It's not New Year's yet, is it? BJ, you're mistaken.

Well, I do make mistakes, but in this instance, I'm right. Allow me to explain: in the church calendar, last Sunday, November 24, was Christ the King Sunday, which is the last Sunday of the liturgical calendar. Which means that December 1 is not only the first Sunday of Advent but also the first Sunday of the new (liturgical) year. And, for those of you that do follow the liturgical calendar, we are beginning year C of the lectionary.

What is the lectionary? Simply put, the Revised Common Lectionary provides 4 sets of scripture (typically) per Sunday. Each week includes an Old Testament, Psalm, Gospel, and Epistle lesson. Generally, these 4 texts provide an overarching theme but not always.

This coming Sunday, December 1, I will be filling in for Sonny while he is away with family for Thanksgiving.

As I mentioned above, we are beginning the season of Advent. There are four Sundays of Advent, each with a specific theme - Hope, Peace, Love, and Joy. During the worship service each week, we will light a candle that is associated with the theme for each service.

The text for the first Sunday of Advent is Luke 21:25-36. Upon first reading it, you may be asking what does this have to do with Jesus coming to Earth as a little baby in a manger? This passage is full of end-times prophecy and talks about the returning Messiah.

Yes, you are correct, and be sure to hold on to the last phrase in the sentence above, "the returning Messiah." Without giving away my entire sermon, the uniting theme between this passage of Luke and the prophecies of the coming Messiah is hope.

Just as God's people patiently waited for the Messiah's arrival and birth, we too eagerly anticipate the Messiah's return, filled with hope and longing. As the prophets of old understood, our world is a fallen one, plagued by injustice, classism, anxiety, and political turmoil (to name just a few of its afflictions).

We wait with hope knowing that when Jesus returns, he will come not to establish some earthly kingdom but to bring His kingdom here on earth.

Some may wonder why we observe Advent. We already know that Jesus came to Earth, was born as an infant, lived a sinless life, and died on the cross to reconcile us to Him. It might even feel like we're denying these events, but that's the wrong perspective. Advent is about preparing for the coming of Christ.

For us, our longing and waiting is for the day when Christ returns, and because we do not know when that will be, just as those of old waited, we too wait with hope and longing.

One of my favorite Christmas cantatas that we performed at Central is called "The Winter Rose" by Joseph Martin. Martin uses the imagery of our world being a garden and Christ being the perfect Rose that restores that garden. The last phrase of the opening selection says, "O let us now remember when God put on the thorn, And Love restored the garden, and the Winter rose was born."
